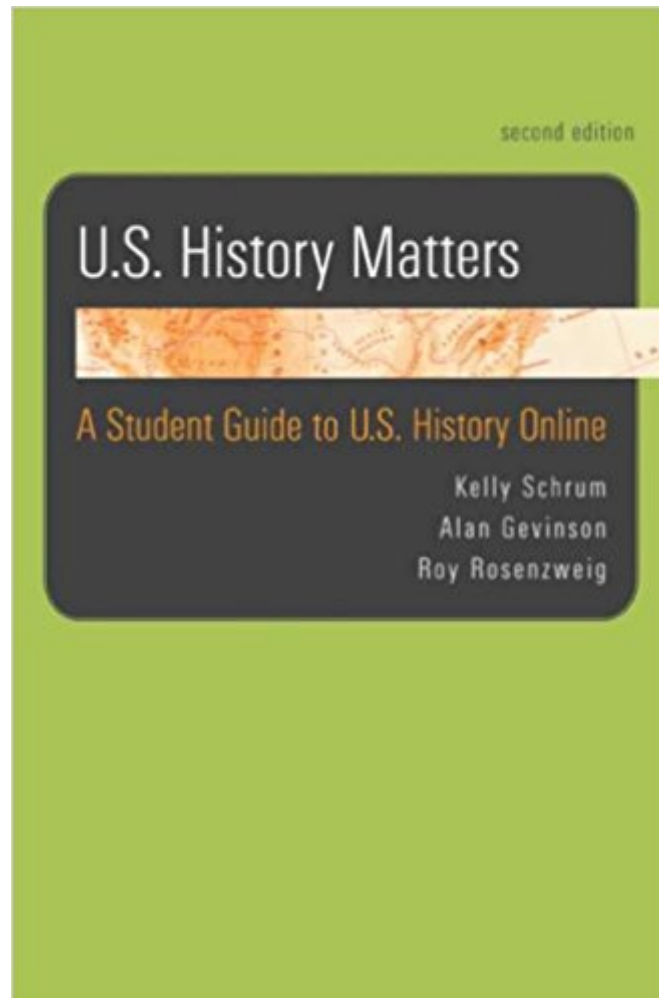




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U.S. History Matters: A Student Guide To U.S. History Online

He authored, co-authored, and edited numerous articles and books, including *Digital History: A Guide to Gathering, Preserving, and Presenting the Past on the Web*, *The Presence of the Past: Popular Uses of History in American Life*, *The Park and the People: A History of Central Park*, and *Eight Hours for What We Will: Workers and Leisure in an Industrial City, 1870-1920*. Rosenzweig served as Vice-President for Research of the American Historical Association and was awarded the Richard W. Lyman Award for "outstanding achievement in the use of information technology to advance scholarship and teaching in the humanities."
